

## 2023 DRAFT BROADCAST SCHEDULE

Round 1: Wednesday, June 28 - 4 p.m. PT - **ESPN**  
 Rounds 2-7: Thursday, June 29 - 8 a.m. PT - **NHL**



The San Jose Sharks enter the **2023 NHL Draft** with **11 selections**, starting with the fourth-overall pick, which could be the earliest in the draft that the Sharks select a player since selecting **Brad Stuart** third overall with a pick acquired from the Nashville Predators, on June 27, 1998.

San Jose has previously made five picks within the top four in franchise history, including three second-overall picks and twice selecting a player third overall. Players the Sharks have acquired in the top four include Stuart, **Patrick Marleau** (second in 1997), **Andrei Zyuzin** (second in 1996), **Mike Rathje** (third in 1992) and **Pat Falloon** (second in 1991).

## 2022 DRAFT RECAP

In **Mike Grier's** first draft as Sharks general manager, San Jose made nine selections during the 2022 NHL Draft in Montreal. After entering the event with the 11th-overall pick, the Sharks traded their top slot to Arizona in exchange for the 27th, 34th and 45th overall picks. The 11th selection became Conor Geekie, while the Sharks utilized the return to select **Filip Bystedt**, **Cameron Lund** and **Mattias Havelid**. The Sharks' full 2022 draft haul included:

## EARLY RETURNS EVIDENT

**Mike Grier's** impact was felt quickly in his first draft at the helm of the Sharks, with San Jose making a trade with the Arizona Coyotes to turn the 11th-overall selection into three picks: No. 27, No. 34 and No. 45. That hat trick of choices has turned in strong early results, bringing **Filip Bystedt**, **Cameron Lund** and **Mattias Havelid** into the Sharks system, respectively.

Bystedt, 19, was named SHL Rookie of the Year after recording 20 points (7g, 13a) in 45 games with Linköping HC in 2022-23, good for third in scoring among SHL skaters age 20 or younger. He lit the lamp in each of his first two games of the season, setting the tone for his strong campaign and closed the season with a point in each of his final two games of the year, March 7 and March 9. He had a strong showing at the World Junior Championship, tying for first on Sweden and at the top of all European skaters with 10 points (4g, 6a), highlighted by a three-point effort (2g, 1a) against Austria in an 11-0 win and another three-point game (2g, 1a) against the United States, an 8-7 overtime loss in the Bronze Medal game.

Lund, 19, finished fifth on Northeastern while leading the freshman class with 23 points (7g, 16a), earning Hockey East All-Rookie team recognition in his first NCAA season. The forward helped the Huskies capture the Beanpot crown and recorded his first collegiate hat trick on Nov. 11 against Boston College, the second game of a season-long four-game point streak that featured six points (4g, 2a).

Havelid, 19, recorded six points (4g, 2a) in 25 games with Linköping HC, finishing tied for fifth in scoring among all of the league's U-20 defensemen, second among blueliners 19 years of age or younger, despite missing most of the first half of the season due to injury. He recorded a goal in consecutive games, Feb. 21 and 23, and finished the year with three markers in the final eight contests. Havelid represented Sweden on the international stage in three contests, recording a pair of assists and a plus-8 rating.

Entering the 2022 draft, Bystedt was ranked 17th among international skaters in the NHL's Central Scouting rankings while Havelid was 19th. Lund was listed

40th among North American skaters on the same poll.

**Jake Furlong** (5th round, 140th overall) earned Halifax Moose Most Improved Player award for his strong season, finishing tied for ninth in scoring among QMJHL defensemen, tops on his team.

After two decades of playoff contention and swapping picks for assets, the Sharks now have an opportunity to deepen the prospect pool and continue building for future success. Since arriving in San Jose, **Mike Grier** has acquired 13 total picks for the 2022, 2023 and 2024 drafts.

The Sharks have also seldom parted with picks over the past year, giving away only their 11th-overall selection in 2022 in exchange for three picks, a 2022-fifth-for-2023-fifth swap, a 2022-seventh-for-2023-seventh exchange, a 2024 fifth round pick in the trade with the Devils, a 2024 third round pick to Anaheim in exchange for Henry Thrun, and most recently a 2023 sixth-round pick to New Jersey for goaltender Mackenzie Blackwood.

In addition to the picks, Grier has been adding steadily to the prospect pool. Shakir Mukhamadullin, 21, and Nikita Okhotiuk, 22, both acquired in the Feb. 26 trade with the New Jersey Devils, were early round picks, drafted 20th in 2020 and 30th in 2019, respectively. Thrun, acquired for a 2024 third rounder, was a fourth-round pick (101st overall) in 2019, and skated in eight games with the Sharks to close out the 2022-23 campaign.

The Sharks acquired Martin Kaut, 23, a former first round selection (16th overall) of the Colorado Avalanche in 2018, along with Jacob MacDonald in December. Jacob Peterson, 23, a trade deadline trade piece from the Dallas Stars who selected him in the fifth round in 2017, had a strong run with San Jose to close the year with eight points (2g, 6a) in 11 games.

**LOOKING FOR MORE AT No. 4**

San Jose emerged from the lottery in the exact spot in the draft order that they entered the night with - fourth. San Jose is entering unknown waters here, as the club has never selected fourth overall in the draft and has not selected in the top five since 1998, when they drafted Brad Stuart third overall.

Since the turn of the century, numerous all-stars, Stanley Cup champions and other contributing players have been drafted in the fourth spot. Some of the most notable NHL stars to come through in the last decade include, in reverse chronological order, Lucas Raymond (2020), Brady Tkachuk (2018), Cale Makar (2017), Mitch Marner (2015), Sam Bennett (2014) and Seth Jones (2013). In the last 23 NHL drafts, teams have selected a forward 13 times (57-percent) and selected a defenseman 10 times (43-percent). The last time a club drafted a goaltender at fourth was in 1997 when the New York Islanders picked 2022 Hockey Hall of Fame inductee Roberto Luongo.

For players drafted fourth overall from 2000 to 2020, the forwards have combined to play 7,473 games and record 1,920 goals, 3,026 assists and 4,644 points, or an average of .62 points per game. The defensemen have totaled 4,460 games played, scored 470 goals and chipped in 1,519 assists for a total of 1,989 points, or an average of .45 points per game. Between them, these 21 players have combined for six Stanley Cups, multiple individual trophies and more than 20 All-Star selections.

**HITTING THE MARK - SHARKS SUCCESS IN FIRST TWO ROUNDS**

It's no mystery that elite talent generally accumulates at the top of each NHL draft - that's what player evaluation is for - so having more chances to draft impact players is a great way to set yourself up to have a deeper and more talented prospect pool. As it stands, the Sharks currently have three selections in the first two rounds of both this year's NHL Draft and next year's NHL Draft after having made three picks within the top 64 of the 2022 NHL Draft. San Jose has never made nine combined selections in the first two rounds of the NHL draft over a three-year period.

Since 2005, San Jose has made 126 draft selections for an average of seven per year, and the Sharks are one of two teams (Vegas) to not have selected in the top five in that span. Their 32 selections in the first two rounds are tied for the fifth fewest in the NHL, not including Vegas or Seattle, and their average draft selection spot in the first round (19) is third-lowest in the NHL. Their average draft selection spot in the top two rounds (34) is just four spots higher than the highest in the League (Pittsburgh, 38).

## SHARKS DRAFT NOTES

Despite high selections being few and far between for the Sharks in the last 18 years - thanks to the tolls of sustained regular season success - San Jose has fared fairly well when they do select early. San Jose is eighth in the NHL in terms of average NHL games played from their selections in the top two rounds, and every single team with more average games played has had a higher average draft position in the first two rounds and selected at least twice in the top five.

### THE NEXT WAVE: A 2022-23 RECAP OF PLAYERS IN THE SHARKS SYSTEM

## SHARKS DRAFT NOTES

**Thomas Bordeleau** (San Jose Barracuda/San Jose Sharks, AHL/NHL) finished tied as the Barracuda's second leading goal scorer and third leading point getter. After a goal-filled start to the season in which he established himself as a premier power-play finisher, Bordeleau was named to the AHL All-Star game in Laval. He posted a pair of assists in eight NHL contests this year.

**Filip Bystedt** (Linköping HC, SHL) had a strong post-draft season in Sweden, establishing himself as a regular in Sweden's top flight and taking home league Rookie of the Year honors just a few months ago. Bystedt finished the 2022-23 campaign with 20 points (seven goals, 13 assists) in 45 games. He was his team's sixth highest scoring forward and was just two points shy of tying for third highest. Some of his best work came at the turn of the calendar, with Bystedt co-leading Sweden in scoring at the 2023 World Juniors (10 points in seven games). Perhaps his most important moment of the season came when he scored the game-tying goal for Sweden with 21 seconds left in regulation in their Bronze medal game matchup against the United States.

**Ethan Cardwell** (Barrie Colts, OHL) capped off his major junior career in dominating fashion, with 90 points (43 goals, 47 assists) in 62 regular-season games and 11 points (six goals, five assists) in 12 playoff games. The forward began the season red hot, with points in each of his first 17 appearances (12 goals, 18 assists) of the year from Oct. 14 to Dec. 3, 2022. He ended the regular season as strong as he started, with a 13-game point streak (15 goals, 10 assists) from Feb. 23 to March 24. With a pair of points (one goal, one assist) in his final OHL regular season game on March 24, he reached 200 career OHL points. He was named the 2023 Sharks Prospect of the Year presented by Kaiser Permanente.

**Magnus Chrona** (University of Denver, NCHC) capped off his collegiate career with a 22-9-0 record, .916 save percentage and 2.19 goals-against-average in his senior season for Denver. He was named NCHC Goaltender of the Year and was named to First-Team All-NCHC honors. On Feb. 15 he was announced as a semifinalist for the Mike Richter Award, awarded annually to the best goaltender in college hockey.

**William Eklund** (San Jose Barracuda/San Jose Sharks, AHL/NHL) rode a mid-season hot streak with the Barracuda into a late season callup with the Sharks. In his time with the big club, Eklund logged three points (two goals, one assist) in eight NHL games, including scoring his first career goal on March 14 against Columbus and a penalty-shot goal on March 16 against Seattle. With the Barracuda, Eklund enjoyed a productive first season on North American ice. He finished second on the club in assists and tied-third in points.

**Jake Furlong** (Halifax Mooseheads, QMJHL) set new career highs in every offensive category after finishing with 50 points (seven goals, 43 assists) in 67 games this season. His +47 rating was fifth highest in the league by a defenseman and his point total ranked 10th best by a blueliner.

**Danil Gushchin** (San Jose Barracuda/San Jose Sharks, AHL/NHL) provided a scoring pop wherever he played. Starting the season with the Barracuda, Gushchin really hit his offensive stride in the second half of the season. The goal-scoring winger posted 25 points in 25 games from Feb. 2 onward, including 10 points in the final seven games of the season. Perhaps most impressive of all, Gushchin played in seven games in a nine-day span from March 31 to April 8, including scoring a goal in his NHL debut on April 1 and potting two goals on April 5 in San Diego.

**Mattias Havelid** (Linköping HC, SHL) missed most of the first half of the season due to injury but established himself as a regular on Linköping's blueline, totaling six points (four goals, two assists) in 25 games. Despite playing in less than half of Linköping's games he finished fifth in SHL defensemen under-20 scoring, and he crossed the 20-minute threshold in three games last season.

**Martin Kaut** (Colorado Eagles/San Jose Barracuda & Colorado Avalanche/San Jose Sharks, AHL/NHL) was acquired in a midseason trade with the Colorado Avalanche and immediately made an impact with the Barracuda. The winger would record 14 points (three goals, 11 assists) in 19 games and would feature in nine NHL games for the Sharks, logging five points (three goals, two assists). He scored his first goal as a Shark on February 23 against Nashville and would end his Sharks stint with a three-game point streak from March 23 through 28. He made his senior debut at the Euro Hockey Tour and was a member of Czechia's 2023 World Championship team.

**Cam Lund** (Northeastern University, HE [NCHC]) started off hot with 12 points in his first 13 collegiate games, including his first collegiate hat trick on Nov. 11 against Boston College. Lund recorded 23 points (seven goals, 16 assists) as a freshman en route to being named a Hockey East All-Rookie.

**Shakir Mukhamadullin** (Salavat Yul'ayev Ufa, KHL/San Jose Barracuda, AHL), a towering two-way blueliner acquired in the blockbuster Timo Meier trade a few days before the NHL trade deadline, set KHL career highs in goals, assists and points this season with 25 points (six goals, 19 assists) in 67 games and chipped in two points (one goal, one assist) in six playoff games. Following the conclusion of the KHL season, Mukhamadullin joined the Barracuda in their playoff push and made an immediate impact. He posted 10 points (one goal, nine assists) in 12 AHL games, including scoring his first career goal on April 7 and notching four assists on April 5.

**Tristen Robins** (San Jose Barracuda/San Jose Sharks, AHL/NHL), like many others, had a promising pro rookie season. His 38 points (17 goals, 21 assists) were good for fifth on the Barracuda, and he made his NHL debut on April 10 in Winnipeg. Robins had an electric March for the Cuda in which he registered 11 points in 13 games.

**Henry Thrun** (Harvard University/San Jose Sharks, ECAC Hockey/NHL) finished his final season at Harvard leading their blueline in goals, assists and points (seven goals, 24 assists). Thrun was named First Team All-ECAC, the ECAC Hockey Best Defensive Defenseman for the 2022-23 season and was named First Team All-Ivy. Following a successful collegiate career, Thrun inked his entry-level deal with the Sharks. The Massachusetts native made his debut on March 30 and logged two assists. He became the first Sharks defenseman to record a pair of assists in their NHL debut since Scott Hannan did so on Oct. 9, 1998.

**Alex Young** (Colgate University, ECAC Hockey) led Colgate in scoring, establishing new career highs along the way with 39 points (21 goals, 18 assists) in 40 games, and helped the Raiders to an NCAA tournament berth after winning the Hockey East Championship. Young scored at least one point in every Colgate game from Dec. 2 through Feb. 25 for an 18-game point streak. He recorded his first collegiate hat trick in a 6-4 win against Harvard on Dec. 3.
